A flock of Double Eagles descends on Denver. At the ANA convention in Denver last month the U.S. mint displayed ten 1933 St. Gaudens double eagles. Over 10,000 people are said to have viewed the coins, which were displayed in a glass case, guarded by heavily armed mint security guards. Whether the coins are recovered mint property of seized assets of a private citizen is for the courts to determine. In either case I believe it's a good idea to put them on public display rather than melt them down into an ingot that has only bullion value. These coins stolen or not are still national treasures. This year's state quarters. Looking at this year's state quarters I noticed they are more artistic than most of the previous years offerings. This is the first year none of the states used the outline of a state as part of the designs. In addition, the use of actual people is kept to a minimum. The only negatives I could find is the pheasant on the North Dakota quarter diverting attention away from Mt. Rushmore and the continued overuse of Bison on the South Dakota quarter. As a group this year's coin show what the quarter program should have been from the start.

2005 Terry Fox Dollar

When Terry Fox was just 18 years old, he was diagnosed with cancer in his leg. Shortly after he was diagnosed, he had to have his leg removed, six inches above his knee. Knowing what he and others like himself were going through, he decided to raise money for cancer research. He hoped to raise \$1.00 from every Canadian in his Marathon of Hope. Terry Fox began his "Marathon of Hope" run on April 12, 1980, starting from St. John's Newfoundland. Terry set out to run one full marathon every day until he crossed all of Canada. He made it for 143 days, the last day being September 1st. The cancer was discovered in his lungs and he had to stop. He passed away in June of 1981.

The Terry Fox foundation is still raising money, \$360 million for cancer research so far. They are still hoping this year to raise \$1 from every Canadian. The Royal Canadian Mint is donating \$20,000 and the author of the book on Terry Fox is donating the proceeds to the foundation.

On Monday March 14, 2005 the Royal Canadian Mint released the Terry Fox Commemorative circulating \$1 coin. On April 12, 2005, it will celebrate 25 years since he started the Marathon of Hope.

The Terry Fox dollars are bronze on nickel composition 26.50 mm in diameter and weight 7.00 grams. There were 11,000 released on March 14th. The remaining 9,000 were released in September to coincide with his last marathon day.

The Terry Fox dollar is "our coin of the month." Look for one in our monthly auction and remember what his desire was!!!
