Editorial

The A.N.A. convention in Milwaukee. This years Worlds Fair of Money will be held at the Midwest Convention Center, 400 W.

Wisconsin Ave, Milwaukee, WI from August 10-12. If you have never attended an ANA convention you should as it is one of the premier numismatic events of the year. In addition to the opportunity to browse the tables of several hundred of the nation's largest dealers there are a number of events and activities in which to participate. At the convention, you can see scores of exhibits encompassing all aspects of numismatics. If that is not enough there are many numismatic theatre programs presented by various experts sharing their knowledge on a variety of subjects. Over the course of the convention, there will also be several national and specialty clubs holding meeting that are open to the public.

If that is not enough to get you to go there are also some very special exhibits from both the U.S. mint and Smithsonian Institution. The

Mint will show the twelve Sacagawea dollars struck in .917 pure gold and sent into space aboard the Space Shuttle Columbia. The contribution from the Smithsonian is a group of pattern coins showing the renaissance of American coinage between 1907 and 1921. Included among the 25 or so patterns are patterns for the St. Gaudens \$10 and \$20, the Walking Liberty half, the Standing Liberty quarter and the Peace dollar.

Lastly, one of the fun things to do is to obtain a numismatic passport. It is a small booklet sold at the door and contains pages telling about all the mints that set up booths in the convention. Also in the folder are slots to place minor coins that the mints give away to passport holders. Many times the person working the booth will stamp your folder with either a postage cancellation stamp or coat of arms of that country. This show only comes to this area every decade or so, so do not miss this opportunity. I hope to see you there.

COTY awards announced. Krause publications recently announced the winners of this year's coin of the year for coins dated 2005. The United States took three honors including Best Crown for the Marine Corps dollar. Other awards went to the Oregon Quarter for Best Trade coin and the Jefferson/Bison nickel as the most popular. Australia won Most Innovative design with the Dancing Man dollar. When tilted the man appears to move in a circular manner as if really dancing. Germany took two awards one for Historical coin honoring Einstein's theory of relativity and Best Gold coin for the world cup soccer tournament. Austria won for best silver coin, Belarus for most artistic and Israel for most inspirational.

Coin of the month

Sing a song of sixpence.

Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue and a lucky sixpence in her shoe. This rhyme well known to brides is believed to bring good luck to their upcoming marriage. While the last part is well known to

English brides, most American brides know very little about the sixpence.

First struck in 1551 during the reign of James I, the sixpence was an important part of British coinage for over 400 years. Under the old system of British money, the sixpence was a logical denomination at half a shilling. In the US until the mid 1800's when foreign coins were still legal tender the sixpence was worth about 12 ½ cents or one Spanish bit. When England switched to the decimal system in the early 1970's some old timers still used the sixpence at the new rate of 2 ½ new pence. By the early 1980's the British government demonetized all pre decimal coinage.

One interesting story about the sixpence is that guitarist Brian May of the rock group Queen used a sixpence as a guitar pick. He also had an agreement with a guitar manufacturer to include a sixpence with all guitars bearing his name. Sixpences were struck in sterling (.925) silver until 1920 when the silver content was reduced to .500. Silver was completely removed in 1947 in favor of a copper-nickel alloy. The last sixpences were struck for circulation in 1967 and for proof sets in 1970.

Collecting sixpences can be an expensive and time consuming endeavor. Early coins (before 1700) are very scarce and even low-grade specimens can run several hundred dollars. After Victoria the coins start becoming more common and the coins issued during the reigns of George VI and Elizabeth II are quite common. You can buy a very nice copper nickel sixpence for a bride in your family for less than fifty cents.
