EDITORIAL

The new dollar errors. Recently the mint reported some James Monroe dollar coins were struck on state quarter planchets. The error occurred when the mint changed the presses from quarters to dollars and failed to remove all quarter planchets before bringing in dollar planchets. Either the mint's quality control department has totally failed or the mint is making error coins deliberately in a devious plot to move their merchandise. This trend of questionable errors began a few years ago with the quarter dollar mule, next came the extra leaf quarters and finally the edge lettering fiasco. The mint claims it caught all the errors but many people believe some escaped into distribution channels. The results of this action will be that collectors will scramble to get mint sealed rolls and bags in an effort to find one of these errors. Those that do will realize a nice profit.

The rise of counterfeit slabs. Since the start of the slab era, one concern was whether an encased coin was actually the one enclosed in the holder. For the most part the holders are secure and it takes quite a bit of effort to open one. Once the holder is opened, it is not possible to reuse that holder. Now it seems some people have found a way to make their own holders and use the inserts from legitimate holders to sell either a lower grade coin or even a counterfeit coin in the place of the original. To protect yourself deal with dealers you trust and pay close attention to both the coin and the holder. If a deal appears too good to be true it generally isn't.

The curse of the Lincoln cent. With the start of spring training hope springs eternal for Chicago Baseball fans, especially those on the north side. In 1908, the Chicago Cubs won the World Series. In 1909, the Lincoln cent was introduced and the Cubs have not won the

Series since. Coincidence? Forget the Billy goat, forgive Steve Bartman if the Cubs have any chance of winning the title we must get rid of the Lincoln cent.

COIN OF THE MONTH

1970-S Large and Small date cents

This month's coin of the month is the Large and Small date varieties of the Lincoln cent. First discovered in late 1970 this is a popular variety in the series and can be found in pocket change if you are lucky.

Accurately telling the difference between the large and small date version can be tricky at first glance. Upon closer examination, there are some definite indicators as to which variety is which. The first indicator is the numbers in the date. On the small date version, all the numbers align at the top. This is also called the high seven or level seven. On the large date version, the seven is slightly lower than the other numbers. The large date cent is also known as the low seven cent. The next indicator is the number nine in the date. On the small date version, the inner loop of the nine is rounded almost to a point. On the large date, the inner loop is flat and square. Finally, the last characteristic is the word liberty. On the small date, the word liberty is weak and somewhat mushy. On the large date coin, the word liberty is clear and sharp.

With the exception of the double die cents and no mintmark proofs, the 1970-S small date cent is the most valuable one in the series. This coin is usually only collected in mint state but high grade circulated pieces are worth a premium. Values for the small date cent range from \$24 in au condition to \$80 in ms67. The large date is very common and runs from about a dollar in ms63 to about \$50 in ms67. You should also check the mint sets as small date cents have been found in there. This variety is not exclusive to business strikes as there are also proof versions of the large and small date 1970-S cents. The proofs are harder to tell apart and even some third party grading services have

trouble telling them apart. Values for Proof small date cents range from about \$50 to \$150 with even higher values going for registry quality coins. The large date is much more plentiful with values ranging from about a dollar to around \$27.
